

WINE RECOMMENDATION



Glenterra Vineyard

2006 Pinot Blanc, Estate (Vancouver Island)

Glenterra Vineyards is one of Vancouver Island's smallest wineries (production of about 550 cases). Winemaker and co-owner John Kelly has turned this into a virtue, handcrafting small lots of exceptional wines, primarily from fruit grown in his 5 ½ acre vineyard. That includes a test plot of about 40 obscure varieties (Helfensteiner, Korento, Cantaro among them) which the previous owner had been trialing. Cleverly, Kelly blends all of his odd reds into a wine called Brio and all of the odd whites into a wine called Vivace, and sells out both

every year.

Pinot Blanc is another example of how Kelly succeeds in elevating a variety about which, usually, there is limited consumer appeal. At Glenterra, the variety takes the place, quite successfully, of Chardonnay. Kelly ferments and ages this estate-grown Pinot Blanc in oak. The wine shows some oak notes in the spicy aroma. On the palate, it presents luscious tropical fruit flavours, with refreshing acidity to give crispness to the finish. 89 points.
