

#### **Township 7 Vineyards and Winery**

# 2006 Semillon (Okanagan Valley)

Only 66 acres of Sémillon is planted in British Columbia. Most of the fruit ends up in White Meritage blends with Sauvignon Blanc (nearly 300 acres is planted). Township 7 is one of only a handful of wineries that release a varietal Sémillon as well as a varietal Sauvignon Blanc. While winemaker Brad Cooper maintains that "blending is where it's at," he also has to keep Township 7 clients happy. They have come to expect these varietals each year, even if the wines have a similar profile.

Of the two, the Sémillon (production 670 cases) turned out better that the Sauvignon Blanc in 2006. The latter is light and flinty, very much a Graves style from a higher than expected crop yield. The Sémillon shows the expected lime flavours and fuller texture. Very dry and crisp on the finish, this is a wine looking for a dish of fresh oysters. 85 points.
