


WINE RECOMMENDATION



Pelerin Wines

2005 Pinot Noir, Rosella's Vineyard

(Santa Lucia Highlands)

Pelerin Wines ("pelerin" is French for "pilgrim") is a small brand based in the Santa Lucia Highlands, producing primarily Pinot Noir and Rhone-style wines from well-known vineyards such as Rosella's and Paraiso. Owner/winemaker Chris Weidemann worked at Newton Vineyard with John Kongsgaard before moving to the Monterey area, where he worked at Morgan Winery. He makes his wine now at Paraiso Vineyards, where he also works part time.

The usual style of Santa Lucia Highlands Pinot Noir is big, ripe and bold, but this one shows more elegance than many of the others. (In that respect, it's a bit Morgan-esque.) The wine, which sells for \$45, offers plenty of ripe cherry and crushed strawberry fruit, some spicy cola notes and a silky, supple texture. The grape source, Rosella's Vineyard, is owned by Gary Franscioni, who farms it meticulously. The grapes Weidemann used in this wine were Clones 777 and 828, along with the so-called Pisoni clone. The wine spent about 15 months in French oak, 40 percent of it new, with the balance being 1- to 3-year-old barrels. All in all, it's a very satisfying Pinot Noir.
